Paul Hobby, and his wife Lisa have two daughters, Faith six, who is going into her second year at Cathedral College, and Grace three, they live in Wangaratta where Paul begun formal training as youth and families minister with the Cathedral Parish in February last year.

in creative writing and written my first novella. It is about the spiritual life, a poetic prose meditation on



New Nave Altar & Statue for Holy Trinity Cathedral

Two recent enhancements to Holy Trinity Cathedral have recently been installed. Both items were kindly bequeathed to the Cathedral by the Community of Christ the King in Taminick.

Arecent addition to the Cathedral Memorial Garden has been a statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which was the work of noted sculptor Hans Knorr, who also sculpted the wooden Madonna and child at the entrance to the Lady Chapel in the Cathedral. The statue is made of sandstone a material Hans Knorr used on many occasions for other sculptures during his long and distinguished career.

The statue makes an impressive and welcome addition to the

memorial garden, and has been placed facing the point in the memorial garden where the ashes of Mother Rita Mary, Sisters Lucy, Margery, Clare and Oblate Lyn Gourlay were interred in August last year.

A new nave altar, also from Taminick, and which was formerly located in the Chapel at CCK was put in place for Christmas.

As is common in many altars, this altar has an 'altar stone' which was consecrated in 1963 by Bishop Gibney of Southwark Diocese in the UK and which purports to contain the relics of St. Fortunatus and St. Felicissimus.

'Fortunatus' (Latin for 'Fortunate One') was the name of at least ten Christian saints from the first through to the sixth century, so it is not clear which 'Fortunatus' has his relics inlaid in this altar stone.

It is clearer however who St. Felicissimus was. He was one of six deacons who were martyred with Pope Sixtus II on or about the 6th of August 258AD. Felicissimus was a companion of St. Lawrence of Rome, the Patron Saint of Deacons, who was martyred 4 days later. Felicissimus is venerated at the Catacombs of Praetextatus on the Via Appia in Rome, where he was buried, although a little piece of St. Felicissimus has obviously found its way to this part of the world.

from the Vicar General



When we moved to Wangaratta from Queensland two-an-a-half years ago, I made the bold step of entering the world of social media, and joined Facebook, a step I had resisted for a few years. The main reason I joined was so that we could keep up with what was happening in the lives of our family and friends. Although we are not really interested in what they had for breakfast, it has been good to keep up with news of big events in their lives. This for me is perhaps the most attractive aspect of social media. Another is the exchange of information and ideas. This can become problematic at times, as some of the ideas that fill social media in the age of 'post-truth' can be at best unreliable and at worst, damaging.

The allure of modern social media is that it keeps people connected, forming online communities which help people from becoming isolated in an increasingly individualistic society. Unfortunately, this promise of community is often an illusion, with recent studies showing that social media, far from creating community, can actually make people feel more isolated from others, especially through trolling and cyber-bullying.

Several recent cases involving young people who have committed suicide after being constantly and mercilessly attacked on social media have highlighted the pitfalls of social media. While I believe that social media has an effective place in our modern world, we still need within our society to be forming genuine communities which connect people in real ways.

There are many organisations which do this in our society, such as Rotary, Lions, Zonta, Scouts and Guides for young people, and sporting clubs to name just a few; and also, of course, the Christian Church. Unfortunately many of these groups struggle to survive in communities which have multiple pressures on peoples time and loyalty.

For the Church, we continue to have an opportunity within the towns and cities in which we find ourselves to form and nurture genuine community. One of our strengths is that we have purpose built facilities which have been part of those towns and cities for many years and we have people who have not only contributed to the life of the Church but also to the life of their communities over many decades. What we need to continue to do is to be open to the opportunities in the places where God has placed us to worship, to serve and to bring people together in real and intentional communities of faith.

It is a big task, but faithful people have been undertaking this mission now for nearly 2000 years. May God bless us for the task before us in our time.

St Luke's Kids Club Yea - Christmas Nativity Play




CHRISTINGLE SERVICE AT HOLY TRINITY BENALLA

Sunday School at Holy Trinity Benalla had a wonderful 2016. We meet on the 1st and 3rd Sunday during school terms. During Advent, we met each Sunday. We shared Advent 1 with our friends from St Aiden's Sunday School. The children made an Advent Wreath to take home and on the last Sunday of Advent we made a 3D Nativity scene. We ended the year at the Christmas Eve Christingle service which saw nearly 20 children attending and enjoyed making the Christingles. Christingles are made up of different

parts, each one being there to remind us of something. The orange represents the world. The candle reminds Christians of Jesus who is the light of the world. The red ribbon goes all round the 'world' and being the colour of blood, reminds us that Jesus died for us. The four cocktail sticks could have either of two meanings; the four seasons or the four corners of the world. The sweets (or sometimes dried fruit) remind Christians of God's gifts to the world including kindness and love. And you could truly feel the love at this service.





Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath, or Advent crown, is a Christian tradition that symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of Advent in the liturgical calendar of the Western church.

It is usually a horizontal evergreen wreath with four candles, usually with a fifth, white candle in the centre. Beginning with the First Sunday of Advent, the lighting of a candle can be accompanied by a Bible reading, devotional time and prayers. An additional candle is lit during each subsequent week until, by the last Sunday before Christmas, all four candles are lit. Many Advent wreaths include a fifth, Christ candle which is lit at Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.





Mothers Union News and Events for 2017

I trust you all had a very enjoyable time with family and friends during the Christmas and New Year celebrations. We were fortunate in seeing all our family well and healthy. It is not so for many people in our communities. It is an important time of the year for us all to take any opportunity for relaxation as we need to take care of ourselves to enable us to care for those who need us.

More from the MU State Council Conference held last September at Ballarat.

Members were introduced to Bishop Tennyson Bogara from the Dogura Diocese in Papua New Guinea. Bishop Tennyson, was staying in Ballarat with Bishop Gary Wetherill, Australian ABM Ministry Leader, and has visited four Australian Dioceses as part of ABM's Martyrs Day. The Dogura Diocese covers a large area in PNG, is also the poorest and most diverse with 25 different dialects. It stretches from the shoreline up into the hills, has no good roads or means of transportation .There is little money and goods are they usually exchanged by barter when available. Dogura Province has been in the grip of famine with no rainfall for two and a half years and there is not enough food. MU members usually greet him as he walks into each village where the churches and the Dogura Cathedral are full of young people. As a young man he wanted to be a pilot as he regularly flew in the small planes but his father said "no you are my only son"!, many pilots die in crashes due to the poor state of runways and difficult terrain. Bishop Tennyson was the only member of his family to receive a formal education at the Martyrs school. He was involved in the church while young and this led to his interest in ABM and eventually he became PNG's Leader for Missions. He travelled to the Phillipines to do his Theological Training but when he returned home the government insisted that his was to be the first graduation ceremony ever held in Port Moresby. After his Ordination in1981he served as part of the parish team at St George's Raboul. He was appointed Bishop of Dogura in 2012. Bishop Tennyson walks up and down mountains at home so he found two hours sitting in a car painful and the cold in Ballarat most unpleasant.

Anne Stewart from Daylesford is an Internationally renowned storyteller who believes "story telling is not just a clever sharing of mind alone but rather a sharing of heart and spirit". Educated in a Roman Catholic school she was a "bit of a pest" and now considers herself to be "Spiritual but not religious." She introduced herself by displaying the Mothers' Union scarf incorporating all the colours that symbolize the culture, lives, families and lands that make up Mothers' Union. She talked of the importance mothers and grandmothers have in family celebrations, kindergartens and schools. She has visited and gathered stories from Mexico, England Ireland, Scotland and throughout Europe. Her favourite topic includes old Celtic stories that have become legends, such as King Arthur's time. A good story should encompass some or all of these "F's" - folklore, faith, food, flowers. According to Anne storytelling is a particularly important role for grandparents.

State President Mrs Jenny Rainsford and the Council members were very pleased with the friendly atmosphere at lunch and at the end of the day where many lingered before travelling home. I wish you and your families many blessings during this year.

Christ Church Kilmore closes its doors!


Christ Church Kilmore closed it's doors to worshippers on New Years Day for a long awaited major renovation project. It is expected the church will be closed for approximately 12 weeks and hopefully will reopen in time for

Christ Church is said to be the oldest inland church in Victoria. On 19th November, 1857, the first stone of Christ Church, Kilmore was laid by Bishop Charles Perry. By January 1861 the first service was held in Christ Church. There had been 3 architects: Perrot, Kingk and Fleury in succession, but despite many setbacks Christ Church, Kilmore was completed (except for the Bell Tower) in 1864.

The renovation works will include repairing damage to flooring and walls, as well as painting and restoring, re-carpeting, heating and cooling, and a new entrance way.

Renovation work started in the first week of January with first the church being completely gutted of furniture and chattels, followed by the carpet being removed and some floor boards seeing the light of day for the first time in decades. Like many building projects, this one has not started off without a couple of issues. On removing the carpet and a few floor boards, damage has been found to flooring and walls. This will certainly slow down the renovation work but better that it is found now before another century goes by!

On Sunday 15th January, the Parish of Kilmore sadly farewelled their Assistant Priest, Rev'd Maryann Leonard and her husband John as they prepared to leave the parish for Maryann to take up her new position in Cobram.

Rev'd Maryann has spent the last 18 months in the Kilmore parish where she served first as Deacon, and in the last 12 months as the Honorary Assistant Priest. Free Lent Resources Encourage Travelling on the Slow Path

ABM's Education Missioner, the Rev Jazz Dow said, "This Lent, as we wait for resurrection, let's listen deeply to God. God's voice is most often heard in the voices of those whose voices are forgotten, silenced, marginalised, or unattractive. God's voice is to be heard through the prophets, the voices crying out in the wilderness."

"These voices can only truly be heard if we slow down and take a step back from the sound bites, the clanging symbols of political rhetoric fed to us by a constant stream of media coverage, the to-do lists of church life, the inner voice that constantly demands we do more, be more, consume more. God's voice is a still small voice heard when we take time, when we lower our voice and open our ears. It is heard in the most unlikely places, in the places that evoke deep prayer," she said.

This Lent ABM invites you to join us on the slow path of prayer and contemplation, of listening for God, a path of prayerful listening that carries us deeper into the mission of God's love in the world. Lent is traditionally a time of introspection and renewal, a time of turning around, turning towards God.

Rev Jazz said, "This is not navel-gazing, rather the complete opposite. If we are going to be able to live into God's mission in the world, it is integral that we take time, slow down and listen to God, and God's prophets. Through this process we find the ground of our being and the shape of our living."

MONTHLY MOVIE REVIEW By Fr Kim Benton

La La Land (2016)

La La Land has not inaugurated a new age of Hollywood musicals, although there is a certain 1950s feel about the movie, because there have been a steady stream of musical films from Grease to Mama Mia, Strictly Ballroom to Moulin Rouge. Writer and director Damien Chazelle's La La Land, which opened the Venice Film Festival is all about retro glamour and style, which seems to borrow from the genre without a whisper of guilt. The opening scene - a single tracking shot - features a jammed LA freeway, the setting for a lavish song and dance number straight out of FAME, wherein we get to meet the main characters even though they don't get to meet each other till many frames later. Mia (Emma Stone) is a wannabe aspiring actor and playwright enchanted with the magic of the old movie stars, who baristas at a movie studio cafe, and Sebastian (Ryan Gosling), a sleek jazz pianist, and although struggling to make a buck is a purist who want to restore traditional jazz to it former glory. Although La La Land is set in contemporary Los Angeles, its heart and soul are rooted in the past, and so are its characters. "Across a crowded room in a restaurant bar a stranger plays the piano" and of course they eventually encounter each other and the sublimity of Old Hollywood makes us believe that it could happen just like this. And these two do meet, scuffle, and fall in love, revealed through a series of song-anddance numbers, composed by Justin Hurwitz with lyrics by Benj Pasek and Justin Paul.

I am not going for spoilers here, simply to say that contrary to genre expectations the ending is not quite as expected. For sure we get to see the heartaches and disappointments of any performer trying their luck and there is much soul searching and coming to terms with reality; but remember this is a Hollywood musical.


Although not known as singers Emma Stone and Ryan Gosling both have a vulnerability that adds another dimension to their singing. Stone uses her eyes to great effect radiating wit, intelligence and emotion and Gosling has this fetching self-derision to conceal disappointment and the love he actually feels. Both look so good on screen and are well served by choreographer Mandy Moore, who demands just enough of their dancing skills. I was watching for piano player double but there is not a single close-up shot of Sebastian's hands in the entire movie. Ryan Gosling is quite an outstanding piano virtuoso.

I enjoyed the movie because I love musical theatre, and although the film struggles to maintain the pizazz this is a joyous ramble full of feeling and moments of passion. It swept the Golden Globes and is earmarked for an Oscar or two. Rated M (coarse language) in cinemas now






