# STARTING THE CONVERSATION...

The Diocese of Wangaratta moves forward with the official launch of our Social Justice Committee. Special guest, the Rev'd Dr Ray Cleary and Bishop John both provided their insights into Social Justice from both a theological and pragmatic framework.

The idea of developing a Social Justice Committee (SJC) within this Diocese was a concept that Bishop John and many others from around the Diocese had long felt was an important part of our Christian call. The Strategic Planning process further cemented the way forward in this regard and a base group of likeminded people from diverse backgrounds were brought together to start to form the Social Justice Committee. This group has taken some time to consolidate thinking on what social justice is in the context of the Diocesan plan, the theological framework and social context. The pillars of social justice were recognised as Access, Equity, Rights and Participation. The priority approach at this time was seen to be around Information

The approach of the SJC (to date) has been to identify Champions on the committee who were committed to commence thinking and action on prioritised social justice issues and who were working towards gathering working groups to be able to address these issues. It became clear that this needed to be made open to a wider group of people with interest and passion in a number of key priority areas of social justice such as domestic violence, the environment, refugees, indigenous issues, rural issues, marriage equality, health and homelessness.

On Saturday 11th February the Committee invited and welcomed interested people from all over the Diocese and even further afield to share a conversation about relevant Social Justice issues and important considerations as we move forward. Bishop John opened the day with his reflections

on Social Justice and acknowledged that this is a Challenging time and as Christians we have a challenging Task ahead of us as we embrace our call. The guest speaker for the day, the Rev'd Dr Ray Cleary also reinforced those thoughts and our call to mission as loving God is about loving others. He also shared some enlightening statistics and information around the complexities of the problems that are faced. His key messages were around forming sound partnerships to address a manageable number of priority areas and grounding our work firmly in theology while understanding the social frameworks of Social Justice.

Bishop John and Canon Cleary offered prayers and blessings for the Social Justice Committee as they move forward as an integral part of our Diocese

Members and prospective members of the Social Justice Committee were pleased to share insights from the Rev'd Dr Ray Cleary and look forward to the challenges that lay ahead and encourage you to walk with them as they as they further explore the way forward

# FAITH IN ACTION

Holy Trinity Cathedral Wangaratta parishioner to represent the Australian church at the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (CSW).

Lesley Lewis has been appointed to represent Australia in the international Anglican Communion delegation going to the 2017 CSW meeting in New York in March. CSW is the principal global policy-making body exclusively dedicated to gender equality and the advancement of women; and is a functional commission of the United Nations Economic and Social Council. Outcomes of CSW establish the normative frameworks advancing thought and priorities facilitating gender equity.

This is the 61st session since CSW was established in 1946 with government and non-government representatives from around the world participating. The Anglican Church of Australia has supported a representative to participate in the annual CSW meeting since 2005.

The annual CSW meeting evaluates progress on gender equality, identifies challenges, sets global standards and formulates concrete policies to promote gender equality and women's empowerment worldwide.

The Australian government has a long proud history of active membership and participation in the CSW; and has integrated CSW initiatives into national policy.

Ecumenical women's movements have also maintained ongoing relationships of participation and support for CSW. Ecumenical Women continues the tradition of advocating for both a liberative gospel and a society where women are free to make choices regarding their health, their lives, their work, and their status in society (Faith at the UN gender in church https://ecumenicalwomen.files.wordpress.com/2009/02/ecumenicalwoman\_report.pdf).

The 61st session of CSW has three themes:

- 1. Priority theme: Women's economic empowerment in the changing world of work.
- 2. Review theme: Challenges and achievements in the implementation of the Millennium Development Goals for women and girls (agreed conclusions of the 58th session).
- 3. Emerging issue/Focus area: The empowerment of indigenous women.

Sustained cultural change regarding the status of women takes a long time and is centred on relationships. One of the purposes of Anglican representation at CSW is to continue the conversation with women across diverse status and walks of life.

On return, Lesley will be seeking opportunities and forums to share CSW voice and insights gained through the experience.

Women and girls do not enjoy the same freedoms, opportunities and privileges as males. Women and girls are over-represented in poverty, and, as victims of gender based violence. CSW provides a forum where government and non-government agencies meet on a global scale to intentionally plan how to improve

the status of women and girls. CSW initiatives and outcomes ultimately guide and inform domestic and foreign policies in member countries to improve the status of women and girls globally.


What do you hope to gain out of this experience?

I would like to have a society where gender equity is mainstreamed. That is; a place where women's issues are no longer invisible (it's not secret women's business). Where women and girls are safe from violence by males. And where women and girls are able to reach their full potential in freedom.

Diocesan Planning - This team is reviewing structures and processes to improve and develop the capacity of the Diocesan Office.

Social Justice - As outlined on the front page there is a lot happening with clear focusses and strategies being discussed and defined, enabling the group to move forward.

# Women in Australian Society and the Church.

In our "lucky country", Australia, women are accorded equality; they are assuming leadership in every sphere of life and excelling in the education stakes. Nevertheless, at least once or twice a week in the daily paper that I read each morning there is an article on the pay gap between men and women, or the small percentage of women in management positions, or the discrimination shown towards women in one or other of the professions. Worse still there are never ending articles about the abuse of women in the home which impacts on an estimated one in five women. What this reminds us of is that even when we have the highest ideals, putting ideals into practice in a fallen world can be elusive and thus a constant challenge. When it comes to the developing world, the lot of most women leaves you in tears.

But what about in the church? Are we better at putting our Christian ideals into practice and specifically, are we better

when it comes to women? I think not; in fact all too often the church lags behind the world. The problem is when it comes to women we are divided on the ideal itself. Many Christians still believe that God appointed men to lead. I cannot tell you how many people have told me in anguish that in their church at least once a month their minister speaks about "male headship" and gives a sermon entirely on this topic several times a year and that he never allows women to preach.

Jesus would be horrified by such teaching. He said not one word on "male headship" and much to the contrary. Even St Paul, would have raised his hand in protest. Yes, in Ephesians 5:23 he spoke of the husband as "the head of the wife" but then he went on to say "the head" should give himself in service for his wife even to the point of giving his life for her. This kind of "headship" is too costly for most men to consider too seriously. Then we should note that Paul affirmed women leading in prayer and proclamation in church (1 Cor 11:5); commended Nymphia who lead a house church (Col 4:15), and greets Junia a woman apostle

(Rom 16:7). In 1 Corinthians 12:28, he says, apostles are "first in the church". What we need to recognise is that Paul in his age and culture, two thousand years ago, was seeking to subvert patriarchy, not endorse it.

If the unfair and discriminatory treatment of women in society and the church deeply concerns you, please consider coming to the Christians for Biblical Equality (CBE) national conference, April 28-30th, 2017, in Melbourne. See for further information and to register, the CBE website, www. cbe.org.au. At the conference Dr Mimi Haddad, the president of CBE International, the Rev Patti Ricotta who works against the mutilation of young women in Africa, and Dr Kevin Giles, a New Testament scholar will be keynote speakers. In addition, there will be twenty one workshops, covering such topics as biblical teaching on the malefemale relationship, the abuse of women in the home, women in indigenous communities, women church planting, gender equality in schools, and much

### from the Bishop



**Dear Brothers and Sisters** 

"You will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." So says Jesus, according to John. "What is truth?" asks Pilate.

We are living in dangerous times: when feelings trump facts; when, if you don't like the truth, you invent alternative facts that suit your purpose better. What we once would have called lies. But now if you're barefaced enough and repeat the lies loud enough and long enough you will probably get away with it. These are times when, in the name of politics, you can make the most outrageous and palpably false assertions, because it's politics and truth doesn't much matter.

We have become so accustomed to lies in the public space that we scarcely notice any more. It's just the way it is.

In recent times our Muslim sisters and brothers have suffered greatly in the stakes of truth. We do not label all Christians as terrorists and murderers because of the actions of a minority of fanatics: encouraging or perpetrating violence in the name of God, for example murdering black South Africans through the church sponsored doctrine of apartheid. So why do we tar all Muslims with the label of terrorism because of the actions of a few?

The proper Christian response is not to demonise, alienate and exclude. Rather we should invite and welcome and try to understand. In the complexity of the modern world, interfaith dialogue is not just an optional extra. It is an absolute necessity. People of faith need to stand together for justice and peace.

Let me be absolutely clear about what I am saying. I am not advocating the sort of approach that papers over the cracks. In fundamental ways the Christian faith cannot be reconciled with the other great world faiths. God as Trinity and the divinity of Christ are non-negotiable and fundamental doctrinal truths which we must assert.

But the great Abrahamic faiths of Judaism, Islam and Christianity share common roots. They are not wholly divergent or contrary. Rather than deal in rumours, misconceptions and lies we should be engaged in talking to each other and listening carefully and prayerfully to each other. The sort of trash talking taking place both in the US and in Australia only serves to alienate and radicalise. It is the truth that will set us free

If we allow public policy to be dictated by fear, then the terrorists have won. If we allow the lies and misdirection to sway us from the truth, the terrorists have won. But we know that perfect love casts out fear. We know that truth will set us free. So let us individually and corporately pursue the paths of love, truth and understanding, that we may live together in peace.


This year we have chosen to combine these ideas. As

# **Special Diocesan Services at Holy Trinity Cathedral**

DIOCESAN CHORAL EVENSONG FOR MOTHERING SUNDAY

On Sunday, 26 March at 5.00pm, Holy Trinity Cathedral will be hosting our second annual Diocesan Choral Evensong for Mothering Sunday. This special Evensong will also include the ceremonial 'Clipping of the Cathedral', which was introduced last year.

The old English custom of 'Clipping the Church' as it is usually called, is a dance-like ceremony in which the parishioners join hands and move around the outside of the church in an unbroken ring, circling the church in one direction three times and then moving in the opposite direction three times, often singing a traditional clipping hymn. Prayers are then said for the Church, especially for the Mother Church of the Diocese, the Cathedral. Due to the size of our Cathedral, we will be 'clipping' the Cathedral inside rather than out. The word "clipping" is Anglo-Saxon in origin, and is derived from the word "clyp-pan", meaning "embrace" or "clasp" and thus is an expression of devotion to the Mother Church.

Everyone from the Diocese is warmly invited to attend and take part in 'Clipping' of the Cathedral. Supper will be served afterwards in Purbrick Hall.

#### CHRISM MASS

On Tuesday, 11 April, the annual Chrism Mass will be held at the Cathedral. This liturgy, which dates from the fifth century, is usually held in Holy Week. At the Chrism Mass, the Bishop, joined by the clergy and lay people of the diocese, gather at the Cathedral to celebrate the unity of the clergy and people of the Diocese with their Bishop. During the Chrism Mass, all present reaffirm either their baptismal or ordination vows. The Bishop also blesses three oils — the oil of catechumens, the oil of the infirm and holy chrism, which will be used in the administration of the sacraments throughout the diocese for the year.

The oil of catechumens is used for those preparing for baptism. The oil of the infirm is used in the sacrament of the anointing of the sick (formerly known as extreme unction). Holy chrism is a mixture of olive oil and an aromatic resin or essential oil. This oil is used in the sacraments of baptism, confirmation, and holy orders and to dedicate new churches.

All clergy and lay people of the Diocese are welcome to attend the Chrism Mass again this year.





#### Mothers Union News and Events for 2017

The service on Ash Wednesday often brings memories of the days of our childhood in a Rectory. Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day meant we were given our last ice cream before Easter. Today it is now a community event and has lost its significance as a time when housewives used up the "luxury" food items in preparation for the austerity of Lent. During Lent we ate very simple food, fish twice a week, cakes and lollies were never eaten, and outings were restricted. Mothering Sunday or "Refreshment Sunday" was the exception. Father," The Rev'd Canon Charles Partridge", was English and provided Mother with the recipe for the Simnel Cake which is still made for the congregation at Nathalia today. He allowed us a piece of chocolate at dinnertime too! On the first Sunday of Lent we were given A.B.M. Mission Boxes to deposit our weekly sixpence pocket money, this was taken to church Easter Day. Lent came to its conclusion in the solemnity of the three hour service father prepared for Good Friday, this solemn period culminating on Easter Day with the services of Celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord. There are still many faithful churchgoers who forgo sweet treats or other pleasures during Lent. The world is not the same and sadly there are so many people who enjoy the "holidays" with no appreciation of their significance to faithful Church congregations.

During my time at the Australian Conference of Mothers' Union last November Dr Ree Bodde' was a guest presenter. She is the Program Director of an organization called "Think Prevent- a program motivating men and women to work together to end men's violence against women and children". She recently participated in a National Summit to "raise awareness about the impact of dowry related domestic violence on women their children and the wider Australian community". During her first conference session she spoke about the different types of violence that can be perpetrated against anyone but more particularly women and children. Elder abuse is of growing concern also. After lunch we regrouped and participated in activities that represent the types of violence often witnessed by onlookers either in the street or in homes. Dr Ree gave each group of women a different scenario to work out a strategy to diffuse a situation before it grew out of control. It was a serious subject but our acting left a lot to be desired resulting in laughter which was not compatible with the nature of that exercise. Ree contacted me recently as she is coming to the Cathedral on April 1st to introduce her program "Think -Prevent Bystander Interventions". These interventions are a helpful guide if you are involved or witness any gender violence in the home or public arena. She is friendly and also listen to and will provide us with simple skills that will be valuable in our communities. It is well worth taking part in the day's presentation and the number of participants will make the day more interesting. Ree is happy to spend time talking to anyone after her workshop.

The church resembles a builders yard at present, but worship continues at the Senior Citizens Rooms in Kilmore in our temporary worship space.






### **Part-time Unit of Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE)** in Shepparton 2017

A part-time Unit of CPE will be conducted in Shepparton in second semester 2017, from 11 July to 22 November. The course will be conducted by the North-east Victoria CPE Centre. It will be coordinated by Dan Murphy, who works as Pastoral Care Coordinator at Northeast Health Wangaratta and is accredited as a Clinical Pastoral Supervisor, with the assistance of Maureen Beattie, who is an Anglican priest associate with Holy Trinity Cathedral in Wangaratta and pastoral practitioner with Northeast Heath Wangaratta, and Anne Wieczorek, a Hospital Chaplain at Bendigo Health, both of whom are Provisional Pastoral Supervisors. It will be located at St Brendan's Catholic Parish, Shepparton.

CPE is one of the most highly recognised programs of supervised education for provision of spiritual and pastoral care, and is rarely available outside the metropolitan area. It carries extensive credit in tertiary religious and theological study programs. It is highly recommended for anyone contemplating working in pastoral or spiritual care especially in a professional role, or in a volunteer capacity, and also for those working in other helping professions.

The program will be conducted on Wednesdays from 9:00 am - 4:00 pm, with attendance on 3 Tuesdays also required (11 July, 19 September and 21 November). Note that on 11 & 12 July, the program will commence at 8:30 am. A further day each week is required for delivery of pastoral care in an approved context and further time is also needed for writing reports on pastoral encounters, so participants need to be able to devote at least about 2.5 days each week for the 20 weeks of the program.

Cost of the CPE program is approximately \$1,330.00, or for those enrolled in theological studies, the cost will be the equivalent of 2 Units of study, payable through their University. You will need to request an application form before 31 March 2017, and applications must be made by 30 April 2017.

Sunday, 5 February was a special day in the lives of three children at St John's Anglican Church Nagambie.

The three children were baptised during the service by Father Gary Atherton in front of their parents, Godparents, family and friends.

Father Gary spoke about the Gospel reading about believers being the 'Salt of the earth' and how that means they are to be trusted and tolerant and confident in passing on their faith."

He spoke about how families bring along their young ones for baptism and how it is the start of their Christian journey of faith and maybe when they are older, they may be confirmed and take on their baptismal promises themselves and strengthen their beliefs into adulthood.

In his sermon he also stated, that during a child's life, parents make decisions for their offspring from the day they are born. Such as what to eat, wear, drink, what kindergarten and school to go to, how to have manners, ethics and values. But when it comes to learning a Christian

faith, they say "They can make that decision themselves." How, when they have not been taught the faith they may have been baptised into when younger?

This is very hard on a child that has had no Christian education. How can they make that decision without guidance from families and church folk?

Many bring their children to be baptised and the child's faith journey sometimes stops there. Wouldn't it be great if those children could be nurtured through their formative years by their families, their local church and learn how to be a caring, tolerant. confident and trustworthy Christian in their community?

Children need to have an all round education. One that includes academic, learning the arts, life skills, sport, and a spiritual foundation. These things can help them become a knowledgeable balanced adult, able to make good choices.

Father Gary presented the three children with a small decorated family made Baptism candle for their special day, and from the parish Mother's Union (MU) branch a children's Bible, knitted teddy bear and Mother's Union family faith information pack.

The children and Godparents were given Baptismal certificates to remember their special day in church and keep for future reference.

St John's parish folk were thrilled to have the families come along on February 5 and some of them would like to consider holding a family service once a month, orientated with lesson, hymns, and fellowship for families and their own regulars. Parents and Grandparents could join in with the children and help nurture them in the Christian faith, and learn about Jesus and make sure they know his name is not a dirty word.

A Kids Club holiday program is being organised for one day during the Easter holidays. Children aged from 5-12 are welcome. To enjoy some games, songs, puppet show, craft food time, and loads of fun. The 'new' St Cuthbert's Yarrawonga - 50 years young!!

On November 5<sup>th</sup>, 1966, St Cuthbert's Anglican Church in Yarrawonga - a modern structure with a massive granite altar - was completed and dedicated with a crowd of some 600 people attending the dedication service prepared by Parish Priest of the day, Father Stanley Goldsworthy.

It replaced the St Cuthbert's church which was consecrated on October 8th, 1897 and served as a parish church for 81 years.

Fifty years on, on Sunday, November 6<sup>th</sup> 2016, a celebratory Eucharist for the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Dedication of the new St Cuthbert's Church was conducted and celebrated by the currently serving parish priest, the Rev'd Canon Michael Jones.

He was assisted with the Eucharist by the Rev'd Jack Thomson, who also preached at the service. Fr Jack was parish priest between 1972 -78.

The 150 who gathered to attend the milestone service received a warm welcome from Fr. Michael, who designed the service used. The service used some of the readings, prayers and hymns from the Dedication Service of 1966, but also included some modern or contemporary liturgy - it was a blended service, which was appreciated by those attending

Church wardens in 1966 Jim Judd and Dr. Neville McCarthy, who were part of the building management group with Fr. Goldsworthy and the late Rex Wright, were readers at the service. Max Grinter, who was a server at the Dedication Service also read.

"It was a shame that Rex ( who passed away earlier this year) couldn't be with us," Fr. Michael said. "He contributed greatly to the life of this parish. It was also regrettable that Bishop Stanley, as he became, was not able to be here. He passed away in 2014. His daughter Louise was able



to attend and his son, Phillip, sent an apology."

Fr. Michael went on, "Jim Judd, like Rex, has contributed greatly to the life of this parish over this past 50 years. Jim has served continuously on the Parish Council over this time and, with others, has been involved in every major project that has happened."

'So, all in all it was a great day for the parish."

Cutting the cake to mark the 50th birthday was a shared arrangement by Mr. Judd, Dr. McCarthy and Mrs. Doris Head. Naturally honoured to be officiating, church attendee of six decades, Doris said, "It was really lovely because I am one of the oldest Anglicans! I attended the old church when (daughter) Lesley and her husband were married." (Doris turns 100 in June this year).

Fr. Michael, expressed his thanks to many of the current day parishioners who had helped coordinate the day. He especially acknowledged the work of Carol Henderson who compiled the book 'History of St Cuthbert's Churches in Yarrawonga, 2016.', with support from other parishioners.

That book commences with the words "the first recorded Church of England service in Yarrawonga was held in the Apollo Hall, Witt Street in 1879. In 1975 the original church building was demolished, having stood for 90 years. Part of the foundation is still visible near the Centenary rock at the front of the church. A new history board mounted

near the front of the church and compiled by Max Grinter with the help of others, helps explain the early history of the parish.

Among the attendees at the milestone 50th service were the five Wood sisters who were married in St Cuthbert's church, two {Marie Gent and Judy McNulty} in the old and three { Helen Purtle, Kerrie Ledger and Betty Conway} were married in the new church. Commenting on the 50th service, Helen described it as a 'joyous service'. It was lovely to catch up with all the worshippers from the past coming together."

Fr. Michael considered it a privilege to conduct the special service. "It was so good to see people who were, and are, part of the history of this place coming together in this way; to see people reconnecting and reminiscing, all of the time recognizing that it has been the worship of God that has brought them together. There was a real buzz of excitement, which is what the church should always have around it,"

An extensive photo exhibition occupied many people who spent a lot of time putting names to faces, not always successfully! After the service ended, 70 parishioners went on a lunch time cruise on the paddle steamer, 'Cumberoona', which cruises on Lake Mulwala. This was then followed by an enormous afternoon tea in the church hall



### REFLECTIONS

From Fr Peter Macleod-Miller - St Matthew's Albury

It is fascinating that "lord of the dance "one of our most popular hymns is also on the "banned list" in many churches because of its wide sources of inspiration and the adventurous, questioning mind of its author In writing the lyrics to "Lord Of The Dance" in 1963, Sydney Carter was inspired partly by Jesus, but also partly by a statue of the Hindu God Shiva as Nataraja (Shiva's dancing pose) which sat on his desk, and was partly intending simply to give tribute to Shaker music. He later stated, "I did not think the churches would like it at all. But in fact people did sing it and, unknown to me, it touched a chord  $\dots$  Anyway, it's the sort of Christianity I believe in. "Carters voice is refreshingly contemporary, he says Your holy hearsay is not evidence Give me the good news in the present tense ...

So shut the Bible up and show me how

The Christ you talk about is living now. St Matthews is almost inevitably associated with ashes, fires early in our history burning the rectory and later the great fire destroying St Matthews itself and recently an arson attempt that could have so easily ended in tragedy. We also remember new life springing from ashes like spring from winter and this is our focus during the coming Lenten season. "Doing the time warp again" has been the churches Lenten tradition but tons of liturgical ash and symbolic recreations have distanced rather than connected us from the realities of the World Christ came to save. Lent at St Matthews will give us an out community" good reasons to change our mind "

I danced in the morning When the world was begun, And I danced in the moon And the stars and the sun, And I came down from heave And I danced on the earth, At Bethlehem I had my birth.

Dance, then, wherever you may be, I am the Lord of the Dance, said he, And I'll lead you all, wherever you may be, And I'll lead you all in the Dance, said he.

I danced for the scribe
And the pharisee,
But they would not dance
And they wouldn't follow me.
I danced for the fishermen,
For James and John They came with me
And the Dance went on.

I danced on the Sabbath And I cured the lame; The holy people Said it was a shame. They whipped and they stripped And they hung me on high, And they left me there On a Cross to die.

## 'Becoming leaders in social capacity and youth engagement'

#### Ball in the mall

Bling, tuxedos and white ball gowns graced the Hargreaves mall on Friday the 16 December with 14 young couples attending the 'ball in the mall'. 14 young couples were chauffeured in vintage cars to a transformed ballroom at Bendigo's CBD shopping mall. Young couples were presented to various dignitaries before taking to the dance floor to show off their well-rehearsed traditional moves to a modern soundtrack. Local organisations, traders and authorities all networked and collaborated together to see a once in a life time experience take place for these young people. Key players in the event were a team of workers from Victoria Police, St Luke's Anglicare staff and a number of individuals and organisations. Beneficially, negative social perceptions about youth and crime rates in the local shopping area were shifted after the event had taken place. All the young people that looked astonishing and enjoyed themselves immensely and moreover, they behaved in a manner that was a credit to themselves, their families and our Bendigo community. In summary, the 'ball in the mall' was evaluated as being a great success and now a calendar event.

#### The Bendigo YOUth expo

The 'Bendigo YOUth expo' was held on the 19 January along the Hargreaves Street Mall. There were over 30 activities and providers in attendance with roughly 300 people in engaged in the event on the day. The concept around the event evolved from the youth engagement team stating that there was a gap in youth actually attending service providers and being unsure as to what was available to them in Bendigo. To bridge this gap the Bendigo YOUth expo came about to bring resources to the sub-population group. There were activities, resource information and representatives from an extensive variety of social pathways. Study Scholarships and work experience placements were secured and exclusively offered for the day. Evaluation surveys were handed out on the day to collect a snapshot of perceptions from the public, traders and organizations involved. Survey results indicated that the event was a success, fun, interactive and another medium to change social perceptions about youth in rural communities. In summary, the project by the youth engagement team achieved their aim in creating another avenue for systematic change in the community's perception about

# MONTHLY MOVIE REVIEW By Fr Kim Benton

#### Manchester by the Sea (2016)

As we head into Lent Manchester by the Sea is a primer for the journey through the desert. A harrowing movie about how events and decisions can devastate individuals, families and communities.

Up and coming screen writer and director Kenneth Longergan's film is a delicate portrayal of one man's struggle with grief and survival. Lee Chandler (Casey Affleck) is a janitor - edgy, tightly-wound, mostly restrained, troubled man who suddenly has to return to his self-exiled Massachusetts home town of Manchester. You see his older brother Joe Chandler (Kyle Chandler) has died. Lee has to make the arrangements - he has no idea what to do. It is midwinter and the ice and snow are metaphors for both the frosty reception he receives and the wilderness of his own inner turmoil. His teenage nephew Patrick (Lucas Hedges) with whom he had a warm relationship is now his responsibility and as such catches them both off guard. And then we learn why Lee has become such a perverse loner. Returning to his home town means revisiting a horrific family tragedy and its consequences (no spoiler details) which packs the biggest emotional punch.

Through a series of back-flashes we learn the history of both families and close friends - this is a tightly-knitted fishing community. Trouble and distress haunts the grim memories of everyone. And although this is a story about the complexity of forgiveness—of self and others, it is also a story about the struggles of parenting and at times highly melodramatic. At one level the movie seems to be a twist on the turgid formula of childish adult being forced to grow up. But the characters are so restrained, so emotionally guarded, so determined to survive that the film's excesses are curbed. There are lots of silences. The pace is at times seem exceedingly slow, which serves to provide access to the deep pain and distress held so tightly in the characters for fear of unravelling. At other times the editing gives just glimpses of characters working through the plot with equal stunning effect.

Casey Affleck's restrained performance is superb and lacks the histrionics that could have undermined the intensity of the film. Lucas Hedges is also excellent as Patrick the popular teenager struggling to make sense of the maelstrom in his life whilst trying to fulfil every teenager's ambition. The other supporting actors; Michelle Williams as Randi (Lee's wife), Kyle Chandler as Joe, Gretchen Mol as Elise (Joe's wife), and C.J. Wilson as George, also contribute to the intensity of the movie with fine performances.


This is an extraordinary film, partly because of its honesty about how men deal with grief, loss, and learning how to deal with the rawness of life, but just as much as for the possibilities for change and being made new. This story of death and redemption will bear repeated viewing. Golden Globe Best Actor Award for Casey Affleck; six Oscarnominations included Best Movie; Rated MA15+ (coarse language, adult themes); in cinemas now.



### Play Dough Recipe

- •Few drops of food colouring

#### Method

Combine all dry ingredients and oil together in a bowl. Stir until well combined. With the help of an adult gradually stir in the boiling water. Stir mixture for for at least two minutes, let cool. Store in an airtight container.


